Plean Feabhsucháin Scoile don Ghaeilge – 2016-2017.

Baseline Data:

In November, 2015,we distributed questionnaires to a cross section of children and parents and all teachers. 1st class, 2nd Class and 4th Class children and their parents were selected.

Data collected from Children's Questionnaires:

53% say they like Oral Irish, 51% like Irish Reading and 45% like Irish Writing. Re. Children's perception of their own ability, results were lower especially in the more senior class – 42% believe they are good at Oral Irish, 60% feel they are good at Reading and 47% believe they are good at Writing. Only 39% say they make an attempt to speak Irish outside of the school.

Data collected from Parent Questionnaires:

Parents are positive about the learning of Irish. 90% felt it is important for their child to learn Irish. 70% felt Irish is important for their Children in order to facilitate further education at third level. 64% felt their child has a positive attitude to Irish. 82% say they do not try to speak Irish at home with their children. 89% say their children never watch any Irish TV programmes.

Data collected from Teacher Questionnaires:

Our staff are very positive about teaching Irish. They have identified the need for more in-school opportunities for the children to speak Irish. They feel it would be beneficial to have a structured progression for the teaching of Gaeilge Neamhfhoirmiuil within the school. They have identified the need for better home-school links, especially with regard to spoken Irish.

STRENGTHS.

- Our Junior classes have a positive attitude to Gaeilge .
- We operate Gaeilgoir na Seachtaine with termly prizes awarded again, this is very successful with Junior classes.
- We have a list of frasai already displayed throughout the school building.
- We celebrate Seachtain na Gaeilge every year this includes a Ceili Mor- allchildren learn and perform Irish dances and sing/play. Trath na gCeist 2nd 6th.
- All classes from 2nd upwards, learn a selection of Irish Music on tin-whistle, Fiddle or accordion taught by an accomplished Irish musician, Coley Mullin.
- Junior Infants to Second Class teachers have just introduced Bua na Cainte, a highly interactive programme, with a strong emphasis on Oral/Aural and Obair Bheirte.

- Pupils perception of their own abilities with regard to Irish diminishes as they progress through the school.
- Attitudes towards Irish diminish as children progress through the school.
- Most parents(82%), do not attempt to speak Irish at home with their children.
- Irish does not hold relevance to children outside the school environment.

<u>Information gathered from interpretation of Drumcondra Irish Tests</u>:

Tests administered to 2nd and 4th class – Jan 2016.

(Not fully collated as of yet, but a marked decrease in Eisteacht scores in comparison with Leitheoireacht and Scriobhneoireacht in the junior class. Fourth Class scored higher on the Eisteacht section.).
